Participants responded to the SCM and BIAS map questions about four of the following groups: elderly people, people in the middle class, welfare recipients, rich people, people with paraplegia, people with Alzheimer's disease, people with Down Syndrome, people with Autism Spectrum Disorder, people with Schizophrenia, people with Anorexia Nervosa, people who are blind, people who are deaf, people with Major Depressive Disorder (depression), people with Attention Deficit Hyperactive Disorder (ADHD), people with Language Processing Disorder, people with traumatic brain injuries. Groups were selected at random.
