Several major research projects were announced in 2021, including significant Commonwealth-funded national projects addressing violence, abuse, neglect and exploitation of LGBTQA+ people with disability, and the impacts of COVID-19 on LGBTIQ+ communities in Australia.

The La Trobe community was very proud when Associate Professor Anthony Lyons was for the second time named Australia's leading sex and sexuality researcher in November 2021. We were also pleased to see an ARCSHS team comprising DECRA Fellow Dr Andrea Waling, Associate Professor Adam Bourne, Associate Professor Anthony Lyons and Gene Lim receive the La Trobe Excellence in Research Impact award for their project Understanding LGBTIQ+ Lives in Crisis.

I congratulate everyone who works with and for the Centre on all your hard work during 2021. Your achievements are all the more impressive given the continuing effects of the COVID-19 pandemic. The University is very pleased to support a Centre that is so deeply committed to work that has a positive impact in the community.

Message from our **Distinguished Ambassador**



One of the many benefits of an annual report is its role in showcasing the full range of work produced by an organisation and giving a face to that work through the teams and individuals it identifies. Looking through ARCSHS' annual report this year, I am heartened by and proud of the determination the team has shown in continuing its important work and the success it has had in doing so.

There are inter-relationships between COVID-19 and past issues linking sexuality and infectious diseases. Strategies of outreach, candour and rigorous research, learned in the context of HIV, have shaped the initiatives of Australian governments in dealing with COVID-19. Although sexual minorities have not been more directly affected by COVID-19 in the same way as was the case with HIV, there are similarities in the risks presented by close contact and intimacy that allow each pandemic to spread. As well,

speaking consistently and directly from a scientific point of view is something we learned from the HIV epidemic. This experience has undoubtedly informed the governmental approach to COVID-19 in Australia and the advantageous engagement with the communities most affected.

In spite of a second year of challenges from the COVID-19 pandemic, researchers and other staff at ARCSHS have continued to make vital contributions to support the health and wellbeing of Australians, including people who have been disadvantaged by the pandemic.

During the year ARCSHS announced several major new research projects that support the health and wellbeing of LGBTIQ Australians. Two national projects in particular - one shining a light on the abuse and exploitation of LGBTIQ people with disability, and another seeking to understand the impact of COVID-19 on LGBTIQ communities in Australia - promise important insights for these communities.

In February, ARCSHS launched the fourth iteration of the ongoing Writing Themselves In project led by Associate Professor Adam Bourne - this time drawing on the experiences of over 6,000 young LGBTIQA+ people aged 14-21, making it the largest ever study of its kind in Australia.

Also launched in 2021 was an important new research program, the Gender, Law and Drugs (GLaD) program, led by ARC Future Fellow Associate Professor Kate Seear. GLaD promises to extend the exceptional work of the Centre as an international leader in the study of alcohol and other drugs and their relationship to community health, wellbeing and social

Turning to ARCSHS' advocacy and training work, Rainbow Health Victoria has continued to distinguish itself as a leading voice in LGBTIQ health, wellbeing and social policy. Its launch of the Pride in Prevention Messaging Guide in February of this year offered a valuable new resource for addressing family violence in LGBTIQ communities. More broadly, its decision to rebrand as Rainbow Health Australia reflects its growing importance across the country. I congratulate the team on this expansion of their LGBTIQ-inclusive practice training to new parts of the country.

The Centre's ongoing achievements are a testament to its dedication during another very challenging year. I wish ARCSHS staff every success in their continued work on research projects and interventions that improve our understanding of sex, gender and sexuality in Australia, and strengthen health, education and social justice outcomes. I remain honoured to be the ARCSHS Distinguished Ambassador, and it is with sincere pleasure that I once again congratulate the Centre for its achievements this year.

Writing Themselves In 4

With support from Rainbow Health Victoria and Rainbow Network, ARCSHS researchers asked 6,418 LGBTQA+ young people about their experiences with education, homelessness, harassment, assault, mental health, community connections and more. Writing Themselves In 4: Understanding the Health and Wellbeing of LGBTQA+ Young People in Australia is the largest ever study on the experiences of LGBTQA+ young people aged 14 to 21 years in Australia.

This is the fourth iteration of the survey since 1998. This round focussed on understanding the positive and protective factors in the lives of LGBTQA+ young people, as well as how health disparities are evident among further marginalised communities.

Data was collected in 2019, and the *Writing Themselves In 4 National Report* was published in 2021. The study's results are a vital source of information to inform policies and

interventions aimed at the health and wellbeing of this population.

The Writing Themselves In 4 National Report was launched on 3 February 2021, with two keynote presentations from lead researcher Associate Professor Adam Bourne and co-author Marina Carman, Director of Rainbow Health Victoria. This was followed by a panel discussion facilitated by co-author Associate Professor Jennifer Power, with panellists Rory Blundell, Oliver Keane, Jasmine Phillips, Deb Tsorbaris and Tim Bavinton.

In addition to the Writing Themselves In 4 National Report, the project also produced four complementary reports with data relating to specific topics broken down at the state/territory level:

These reports cover issues that can at times represent challenges for LGBTQA+ young people, such as mental health, discrimination and abuse, as well as aspects of life that can enhance health and wellbeing, such as supportive relationships and community engagement.


















Understanding the impediments to uptake and diffusion of take-home naloxone in Australia

Report launch and findings from a large qualitative study

This seminar launched the final report of an Australian-Research-Council-funded qualitative study investigating impediments to the uptake of take-home naloxone in Australia.



The term 'take-home naloxone' refers to a variety of life-saving initiatives in which a medication (naloxone) is made available to non-medically trained people for administration to others experiencing an opioid overdose. Despite a range of efforts to expand these initiatives over the last 8 years, the uptake of take-home naloxone in Australia remains inconsistent.

Between 2017 and 2019, interviews were conducted with people who consume opioids in New South Wales and Victoria - some of whom had experience of using take-home naloxone - as well as relevant health professionals. These interviews gathered insights on perspectives on and experiences of naloxone, and broader issues shaping the uptake and diffusion of take-home naloxone in

The project summary report, Understanding the impediments to uptake and diffusion of take-home naloxone in Australia, emphasises that, while participants across all groups viewed take-home naloxone as necessary and effective, it needs to be supported by broader social, institutional and legal shifts. Among such shifts, initiatives are urgently needed to de-stigmatise opioid overdose.

The report was launched on 17 February 2021 at an online seminar presenting key findings from the project and recommendations for policy and practice. It also introduced another major public output,

Overdoselifesavers.org - Australia's first dedicated website presenting personal stories of opioid overdose and the use of take-home naloxone to save lives.

Telehealth for **hepatitis C treatment**

COVID-19 has made the utility of telehealth abundantly clear, with people able to access essential primary health services in their own homes. To consolidate the opportunities of telehealth, this project worked to understand how telehealth could better enable access to treatment and healthcare for people living with hepatitis C, and how to better support the needs of healthcare practitioners using telehealth.

The recommendations of this project's final report include involving peer advocates and harm reduction workers in the design and delivery of telehealth models of care, developing additional messaging and health promotion to ensure people are aware of telehealth availability, supporting relationshipbuilding in telehealth settings, and supporting measures to increase access to video telehealth where it would be beneficial. With the advent of direct-acting antiretroviral (DAA) medications, which have made a significant difference to treatment for hepatitis C, strengthening the delivery of telehealth services has the potential to support Australia's commitment to the World Health Organization's goal of eliminating hepatitis C by 2030.

Members of the Drugs, Gender and Sexuality team launched the final report, *Understanding experiences of telehealth care delivery for hepatitis C treatment in Australia: Findings and recommendations*, from the project via a webinar held online on 11 November 2021, featuring presentations on the

findings and recommendations of the project, and a panel discussion addressing harm reduction and peer support, advocacy work and healthcare practice.



Improving Spiritual Health Care for **LGBTQA+ Australians**

This project aims to investigate the history, scale, nature and impact of LGBTOA+ conversion practices and ideology in Australia. This will be done through a series of focus groups and interviews with survivors, advocates

and service providers, as well as a national survey of the religious experiences of LGBTQA+ Australians. These data will be used to better understand the impacts of conversion practices and develop resources to support improved spiritual and mental healthcare for survivors. This study is timely given recent changes to law in some Australian states and territories banning conversion practices and enhancing investment in services to support survivors.

Understanding Service Support Needs of LGBTIO People Experiencing **Family, Domestic and Sexual Violence**

The overarching aim of this project is to inform and improve the capacity of family, domestic and sexual violence service providers to understand and address the needs of LGBTIO communities. This includes exploring expert opinion as to how family, domestic and sexual violence services can appropriately support LGBTIQ communities; understanding the needs and experiences of LGBTIQ people accessing such services; and identifying models of good practice across the family violence sector in Australia. The project also includes development of guidance to help enhance LGBTIQ-affirming family violence service provision in the future.

Violence, Abuse, Neglect and **Exploitation of LGBTQA+ People with** Disability

This project is designed to inform the findings and recommendations of the Royal Commission into Violence, Abuse, Neglect and Exploitation of People with Disability. It involves a comprehensive secondary analysis of the Writing Themselves In 4 and Private Lives 3 survey data, with a focus on LGBTQA+ survey participants who reported a disability. Previous research on this topic is scarce, and this project will provide important new knowledge and insights, particularly in relation to experiences of violence and abuse, as well as on related issues such as mental health. Outcomes include a large report that presents results from the analyses and a translational workshop conducted for the Royal Commission

Pride and Pandemic: Examining the Impacts of COVID-19 on LGBTIO+ **Communities in Australia**

In partnership with LGBTIQ+ Health Australia (LHA), ARCSHS is conducting the Pride and Pandemic project to explore the impacts of COVID-19, and associated pandemic restrictions, on the mental health and wellbeing of LGBTIO+ communities in Australia. LGBTIQ+ populations are already disproportionately impacted by mental ill-health and suicidality, experiences of family violence and housing insecurity.



Taken together, these would suggest that many in the LGBTIQ+ communities entered the pandemic in a more challenged position than may have been the case for other sections of the population. Pride and Pandemic aims to understand in depth how the pandemic shaped the mental health experiences of LGBTIQ+ people, including how they accessed diverse forms of support. The study involves a mixed-method approach to examining these issues, including a national online survey of LGBTIQ+ people, and a series of focus groups among specific intersections of the population.

Writing Themselves In 4: **Understanding the Health and** Wellbeing of LGBTQA+ Young People in Australia

The National Report and four state-specific summary reports were published in 2021.

Private Lives 3: A National Study of the Health and Wellbeing of LGBTIQ People Living in Australia

It is the third iteration of the Private Lives series, following Private Lives 2 in 2011 and the original Private Lives project conducted in 2005. The Private Lives 3: The health and wellbeing of LGBTIQ people in Australia national report was launched in November 2020. A Victorian state report was released in early 2021 and is followed by a series of peer-reviewed publications.

Impact and Sustainability of LGBTIQ **Family Violence Services During the COVID-19 Pandemic**

Family violence is a significant issue for LGBTIQ populations, yet community members often face barriers when it comes to identifying experiences of family violence and accessing LGBTIQaffirming services. This project examines developments in LGBTIQ family violence services and the ways in which Thorne Harbour Health and Switchboard Victoria responded to the challenges of the COVID-19 pandemic. A particular focus is change and innovation in the remote delivery of services, including telehealth. This project will create opportunities for family violence services to share ways in which they adapted and innovated during the pandemic, with the aim of improving service delivery for LGBTIQ communities.

Understanding the Health and Wellbeing of Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander LGBTQA+ People

In 2019, ARCSHS conducted Private Lives 3 and Writing Themselves In 4 and were successful in recruiting a large sample of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander LGBTIQ people. With funding from VicHealth and in partnership with colleagues at the Telethon Kids Institute, we are now

working with a collection of Indigenous communities to consider, analyse and articulate findings specific to this population. We anticipate valuable new knowledge about the health-related needs and experiences of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people and a set of evidence-based recommendations, devised in meaningful partnership with Indigenous communities, for policy and practice.

Examining Risk and Protective Factors for the Development of Gambling-Related Harms and Problems in Victorian LGBTIO+ Communities

Previous research at ARCSHS has also identified that many LGBTIQ people perceive challenges in accessing mental health services, and instead rely on informal support networks. This project examines the nature of supports for mental health and suicide prevention provided by peers or community leaders within LGBTIQ communities in Melbourne. In doing so, it explores their lived experience of providing this



support, and seeks to understand how they can be better supported in their roles to identify, respond and refer during times of mental health crisis.

Connection to Community and Same-Sex Attracted Women's Mental Wellbeing

This project will use existing data from the Writing Themselves In 4 and Private Lives 3 surveys to explore the role of participation in and connectedness to community for building resilience and serving as protective factors for mental health outcomes among young and adult same-sex-attracted Australian women. Specifically, the project will examine the pathways between experiences of harassment and abuse and resulting mental health outcomes, including psychological distress and suicidality, and investigate the potential role of participation in and connectedness to the LGBTQ+ community in moderating these pathways.

Establishing an International Research Collaboration to Improve Health Outcomes Associated with Cannabis Use among 2SLGBTQ+ Youth

This project, supported by a Canadian Institutes of Health Research planning grant, aims to establish a set of new international interdisciplinary research collaborations, including partners from Canada, the United States, the United Kingdom and Australia. Together, the project builds a new program of research focussing on health outcomes associated with cannabis use among two-spirit, lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, queer and other sexual and gender minority (2SLGBTQ+) youth (aged under 30 years).

Social responses to HIV and viral hepatitis

Lived Experiences of Treatment for Hepatitis C in Australia: An Online Resource for People Considering Treatment, Members of the Public, Healthcare Workers and Other Professionals

This project aims to support the uptake of new hepatitis C treatments. With the introduction of new treatments in 2016, the Australian Government adopted the WHO's goal of eliminating the disease by 2030. While early treatment rates were high, they have since plateaued, with stigma and poor information considered key obstacles. This project will generate new knowledge on treatment decisions and experiences, using a proven qualitative methodology. In doing so, it will produce a website covering personal experiences of treatment, issues in treatment decision-making, and advice on enhancing life during and after treatment. It will tackle hepatitis-Crelated stigma, and inform and benefit potential treatment users, families and relevant professionals.

Addressing Hepatitis C-Related Legal, Policy and Practice Discrimination in a Post-Cure World

This project aims to address the legal and policy dimensions of hepatitis C discrimination. Hepatitis C is a major public health challenge linked to profound discrimination, including in law and policy. Treatments introduced in 2016 improved cure rates, and optimism about disease elimination is high, but questions remain about discrimination faced by those who are

cured. This interdisciplinary project's goal is to generate new knowledge about hepatitis-C-related discrimination in a post-cure context, and to identify opportunities for legal and policy reform. Expected outcomes of the project include better legal, social and policy outcomes for Australians cured of hepatitis C, significantly benefiting these individuals directly and society more broadly.

HIV Futures

HIV Futures is a periodic survey of people living with HIV (PLHIV) in Australia that has been running since 1997. The survey focusses on quality of life among PLHIV, including treatment use, relationships, stigma and discrimination. These data provide evidence against which indicators in the Australian National HIV Strategy are measured. In 2021, data were collected for HIV Futures 10. Findings will be available in the second half of 2022.

W3 Project: Understanding What Works and Why in Peer-Based Health **Promotion Approaches in HIV and** Hepatitis C - Stage 3

The What Works and Why (W3) Project (w3project.org.au) is a groundbreaking study that uses systems thinking to investigate the role and influence of peer-led programs within their community and the health sector and policy environment. This year, the W3 team continued work on Stage 3 of the Project. This stage is a national study of how well peer-led responses achieve and sustain the four W3 Functions engagement, alignment, adaptation and influence - in their work. This stage will pool resources and data from selected

peer-led responses in multiple states across Australia, with the aim of creating a consolidated evidence base showing the quality and impact of peerled HIV and hepatitis C programs. This will support peer-led responses to demonstrate their full impact and value; enhance the implementation, quality and impact of their programs; and respond quickly and confidently to rapid changes in the broader HIV and hepatitis C responses. It will also generate stronger and clearer evidence of what works and why, and provide insight and guidance for the investment and scale-up of peer programs in priority populations. During 2021, collaborative work was conducted with the partner organisations to develop an agreed-upon set of evaluation indicators to measure quality and impact across all four W3 Functions at both program and organisation levels.

Understanding Experiences of Telehealth Care Delivery for Hepatitis C Treatment in Australia

This qualitative study investigates consumer and provider perspectives on telehealth for hepatitis C care and treatment during the COVID-19 pandemic, to develop new knowledge on the role of telehealth in hepatitis C care delivery more broadly.

Reducing Stigma and Discrimination Associated with Blood-Borne Viruses and Sexually Transmissible Infections: Developing a Stigma **Reduction Toolkit for Victorian** Healthcare

This project aims to reduce stigma and discrimination in healthcare settings. There have been significant advances in the testing, treatment and prevention of blood-borne viruses (BBV) and sexually transmissible infections (STI) in the past decade. However, as identified in Australia's five national strategies 2018-2022 and Victoria's suite of BBV and STI strategies 2016-2020, stigma and discrimination continue to discourage people from





seeking BBV and STI prevention, testing, treatment, support and care services. Using a tailored qualitative methodology, this project will develop a new stigma and discrimination intervention toolkit to reduce the stigma and discrimination associated with BBV and STI in Victorian health service settings. The project will directly tackle stigma and discrimination in Victorian healthcare settings and deliver a stigma intervention development model that can be used to produce practice-ready toolkits and related initiatives for other stigmatised areas of healthcare.

HIV Intersections Community of Practice

This project strengthens the work of the HIV Intersections Community of Practice in Victoria to support agencies and programs to work on HIV and intersecting issues, including (but not limited to) HIV and international mobility, culturally and linguistically diverse communities, and Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander communities. This includes facilitation of quarterly community of practice learning forums and coordination of the HIV and Intersectionality Symposium. The Community of Practice works to more meaningfully and realistically meet the needs of under-served populations (including First Nations peoples, migrant and refugee communities, heterosexual people, women, sex workers and people who inject drugs) in relation to HIV prevention, testing and linkage to HIV care.

Blood-Borne Virus (BBV) Sector Development Program: Supporting the HIV and Hepatitis Workforce

The BBV Sector Development Program is a knowledge translation and implementation program that supports the Victorian BBV health promotion, community health, allied health and policy workforce to respond effectively

to HIV, hepatitis B and hepatitis C. The **BBV Sector Development Program** supports agencies and programs to identify and engage in the activities that will in turn support the implementation of the Victorian BBV Strategies. The Program works to embed new and existing knowledge into policy and practice, to maximise the impact of ARCSHS' research and to support and strengthen the HIV and hepatitis partnership response. The BBV Program facilitates several Communities of Practice and working groups, including the BBV Workforce Network and the HIV Intersections Community of Practice. Other activities include hosting two major annual forums in collaboration with research, community and health practitioners, and producing the monthly BBV News bulletin, which features the latest news, research, resources and upcoming

Integrated Hepatitis C Services Re-Orientation Project

In 2018, the Victorian Government Department of Health and Human Services funded ARCSHS' BBV Sector Development Program for 3 years to develop a framework of contemporary nurse-led models of care, and to coordinate a community of practice for the 12 funded services. The aim of this project is to align the Integrated Hepatitis C Services with the Victorian hepatitis C strategy 2016-2020, with the goal of eliminating hepatitis C.

Evaluation of National Peak Community Organisations (AFAO, NAPWHA and Scarlet Alliance) and their Contribution to the National BBV and STI Strategies

ARCSHS was commissioned by the Australian Federation of AIDS Organisations (AFAO), the National Association of People with HIV Australia (NAPWHA) and the Australian Sex Workers Association (Scarlet Alliance) to evaluate the leadership, coordination and capacity-building role of these peak community-led organisations. The purpose of the evaluation was to examine recent evidence of the overall quality and

impact of AFAO, NAPWHA and Scarlet Alliance (independently and collectively) in their unique roles within the national BBV and STI response, and to identify gaps, barriers and opportunities for a strengthened national response to BBV and STI.

Missing Voices: Building HIV Positive Women's Meaningful Engagement with HIV Clinical and Cure Research

PLHIV Peer Navigator Implementation Study

This project aims to identify and articulate the core elements and strategies for the effective implementation and scale-up of an HIV peer navigation program (PNP). The PNP involves trained staff living with HIV who provide peer education and

support for people living with HIV in clinical healthcare settings. These staff are employed, trained and managed by Living Positive Victoria and provide the service within partner clinics on an outreach basis. The study will collect data from internal evaluation and monitoring embedded in the peer support service to assess implementation outcomes (such as acceptability, adoption, feasibility, appropriateness, fidelity, cost, penetration and sustainability) as well as to assess its effectiveness in outcomes such as quality of life, healthcare engagement, resilience, health literacy and treatment attitudes. Data have been collected through a mix of online surveys, interviews and focus group methods from clients of the PNP (service evaluation), the peer navigator staff (feedback on the implementation of the program) and staff at the partner clinics (feedback on the implementation of the program).

Asia Pacific Men Who Have Sex with Men (MSM) Internet Survey (APMIS): A Pilot Multi-Country HIV **Surveillance Survey**

This pilot project involves establishing the feasibility of implementing a largescale, multi-country online survey of

HIV and sexual health among gay, bisexual and other MSM in Asia and the Pacific. The pilot project involves a survey conducted in Thailand, Malaysia, Indonesia, Vietnam and Japan, and examines the likelihood of achieving sufficient scale and diversity of respondents via various recruitment methods. The pilot survey will also capture large-scale data pertaining to the use of new HIV prevention technologies, including pre-exposure prophylaxis, and engagement with HIV treatment services.

Sexual health and wellbeing

Young People and Sexual Health Information

This study was commissioned by the Australian Government Department of Health. It seeks to better understand. what sources of sexual health information young people access, how they access these sources, why they choose certain sources over others and how they determine whether or not a source is reliable or trustworthy. The aim of the study aligns with the Fourth National Sexually Transmissible Infections Strategy 2018-2022, which identified the need for initiatives that support sexual health and address



stigma affecting health-seeking activity, including among the priority population of young people.

Seventh National Survey of Secondary Students and Sexual Health

A national survey of the sexual attitudes, knowledge and experiences of Australian adolescents has been carried out approximately every 5 years since 1992. The seventh survey, conducted in 2021, adds to this long-term project, informing policy, program and curriculum development, enabling measurement and reporting on key national strategic indicators related to sexually transmissible infections and blood-borne viruses, and providing ongoing contributions to the scientific literature on the sexual health and wellbeing of young people. The national

report is set to be released in the latter half of 2022.

Improving Understanding of Effective Ways to Build Young People's Sexual Health Literacy and Support Relationship and Sexuality Education in Online Spaces

This project aims to improve understanding of the ways in which young people search for and engage with information on, or conversations about, sexual health and sexual rights in digital environments. The project seeks to inform more effective digital sexual health promotion and education. The study involves interviews with young people, sexual health educators and digital content specialists about ways in which the online environment provides opportunities to support sexual health among young people and to ensure young people are engaged in conversations about sexuality, pleasure and consent in ways that are meaningful and supportive of good sexual health outcomes.

Primary Prevention of Sexual Violence Against Women: Combining Evidence and Practice Knowledge for Policy Reform

This evidence review and service/advocacy sector collaboration is the first stage towards the development of an Australian Government research agenda on the primary prevention of sexual harassment and sexual violence against women. This body of research is specific to the primary prevention of



sexual violence; however, it builds on existing national policy outlined in the Fourth Action Plan 2019-2022 of the National Plan to Reduce Violence against Women and their Children 2010-2022 and foundational work by Our Watch, Australia's National Research Organisation for Women's Safety (ANROWS) and VicHealth to monitor and guide practices towards the overall prevention of violence against women and children. Final reports were released in 2021.

The Third Australian Study of Health and Relationships (ASHR3): A National Representative Sexual Health Survey

Sexual and reproductive health is fundamental to human happiness and wellbeing and to the fabric of society. Policies and services to support sexual and reproductive health require accurate data on the behaviour, attitudes and sexual health outcomes of the population. These parameters have been measured twice through the

ASHR, in 2001/2002 and 2012/2013. The third ASHR survey comes at a time of major social, technological and medical changes, many affecting the sexual and reproductive health of Australians. ASHR3 will be a nationally representative survey of over 20,000 Australians aged 16-69 years. The three consecutive ASHR surveys will provide time-trend data over 20 years and upto-date nationally representative prevalence estimates. The findings will inform health promotion, the education curriculum, clinical and counselling services, and national and state strategies.

Understanding the Health and Social Wellbeing Needs of Sex Workers in Victoria

The Department of Health supported this qualitative project in view of imminent law reform set to decriminalise sex work in Victoria. The project seeks to explore the needs of



diverse sex workers in depth, including street and brothel-based, licensed and non-licensed cis male and female LGBTQ, Indigenous, migrant and nonmigrant sex workers. By deploying a peer-inclusive approach, it examines sex workers' experiences with Victorian services and what they need to safeguard their physical, sexual and mental health. In doing so, the project will inform the improvement and reconfiguration of service provision for sex workers in Victoria in a decriminalised environment.

Victoria Survey of Secondary Students and Sexual Health 2018

Data from the Sixth National Survey of Secondary Students and Sexual Health is being utilised to develop a state-level report for Victoria. Findings will inform sexual health policy and programs, as well as curriculum development at a state level. The full report will be released in early 2022.

Improving Prevention of Sexual Assault in Regional Victoria (Industry PhD Project)

CASA-CV conducts a number of programs related to addressing and preventing sexual assault in the Central Victorian region. This industry PhD will develop the research skills of the candidate (Emily Corbett) to help further the mission of CASA-CV through collaborative research on the unique contexts of rural, regional and remote environments, and how these interact across various systems and subsequently impact on the experiences of survivors of multiple occurrences of sexual assault. Findings will help to inform policy and practice aimed at addressing and preventing sexual assault in the region.

LifeStyles Sex-Ed

ARCSHS supports the moderation of an educator portal on the LifeStyles website (lifestyles.com.au) to support teachers involved in sexuality education. This project also manages the delivery of sex education resources to thousands of teachers across Australia and develops quarterly newsletters to keep sex education teachers updated on current research, resources and training opportunities. In addition, the project team consulted with LifeStyles and their partners in 2019/2020 on the development of a new evidence-based classroom resource, Sex Edventures - a chooseyour-own-adventure-style video resource and accompanying teacher's guide for classroom use, released through the new LifeStyles educator portal in August 2020. An evaluation of the program is currently underway with findings due in late 2022.

Best-Practice Lawyering for Victims of Domestic and Family Violence

Representing individuals where domestic and family violence (D&FV) is alleged presents unique challenges to lawyers who may have limited conceptions of their role, make assumptions about victims of D&FV and its causes (including assumptions based on ideas about alcohol, other drugs, or gender), and how they should respond to violence. Lawyers may also face particular struggles balancing their duties to the court with their duties to clients, especially when acting across diverse legal contexts. Research has documented the need to improve the quality of lawyering around D&FV. This pilot project explores how lawyers conceptualise 'good' D&FV lawyering and considers opportunities for reforms to education, legal ethics or the law to improve legal processes and outcomes, especially for victims.

Sex, gender and consumption

A World-First 'Post-Human Rights' Framework for Drug Policy: Improving Social, Economic and Health **Outcomes**

Globally, recognition is growing that common prohibitionist drug policies contribute to drug-related harms and have not succeeded. Identified harms include the current drug overdose crisis in North America and a surge in overdose deaths in Australia, adding new force to calls for urgent reform. Many advocates argue that human rights considerations can inform improvements to drug policy. However, human rights have traditionally been less reliable for those who fail to fit normative ideas of 'the human' (e.g., women, LGBTQI+ people, people who use drugs). This project seeks to generate new knowledge on whether human rights can indeed guide reform that improves social, economic and health outcomes, or if a new 'posthuman rights' framework that takes account of feminist, queer and other critical approaches to human rights is needed. The project will inform Australian legal, policy and practice reforms as well as international efforts to reduce drug-related harms.

Improving Australia's Legal, Policy and Educational Response to the **Technological Transformation of Sex** and Intimacy

This project aims to understand the ways in which new technologies are integrated into the sex lives and intimate relationships of Australians. Its outcomes will be increased understanding of the ways in which new technologies benefit or support people in their sex lives and relationships so we can more comprehensively engage with ethical, legal, human rights and health



concerns. Recommendations will be made as to how Australian policy, regulatory and educational systems can best respond to emerging concerns.

Analysing Gender in Research and Policy on Alcohol-Related Violence among Young People

This project compares the treatment of gender in research and policy addressing alcohol-related violence among young people in Australia, Canada and Sweden. Employing insights from feminist and science and technology studies, it includes analysis of quantitative research and policy texts, and semi-structured interviews

with researchers and policy stakeholders exploring the role gender plays in alcohol-related violence. The project will inform the development of more effective and equitable responses to alcohol-related violence among young people in Australia.

Sexuality, Masculinity and Technology: Men and Intimacy in the **Digital Age**

This project aims to understand young Australian men's experiences of sexual intimacy and technology use, and how those experiences relate to their masculinity and sexual engagement with women. This project will enhance knowledge on the ways young men engage with women, and enhance capacity to build community collaboration in working with men on gender equality.

Addressing Gender and Sexuality in **Drug Education: Developing Effective** and Ethical Drug Education

This project aims to generate new knowledge on the relationship between young people's concerns about drugs and the priorities informing drug education. Alcohol and illicit drug use costs Australia almost \$40 billion per year and is a leading contributor to the total burden of disease for young Australians. Drug education is a key strategy used to reduce youth alcohol and illicit drug-related harm, yet it has been the subject of sustained criticism for its inability to address youth effectively, including the gendered and sexual dimensions of harm. Outcomes expected from this project include more effective and equitable drug education materials. Overall, the project seeks to reduce alcohol and illicit drugrelated harm among young Australians. This project was awarded in 2021 and will commence in 2022.

Muscling up: Australian Men, **Sexualisation and Body Image** Enhancement

This study investigates social changes related to men's body modification practices and their meanings, including the ways in which contemporary Australian men's reflections on attractiveness, desirability and sexual performance are entangled with their bodily labours and gendered identities. Using a qualitative approach, including 30 in-depth interviews with men aged 18 to 45, the research has explored questions related to male body image ideals, masculinity and health. Focus groups were also utilised to explore women's perspectives on the increased visibility of male bodies in Australian culture and their interactions with men engaged in related body modification practices. Findings from this study were published in 2021.

Understanding the Impediments to **Uptake and Diffusion of Take-Home** Naloxone in Australia

Opioid overdose is a major health and social problem in Australia. Programs exist overseas and in all Australian jurisdictions to provide opioid consumers with 'take-home' naloxone (THN) to reverse overdose, but uptake in Australia remains inconsistent. This qualitative project investigated impediments to THN uptake. Between 2017 and 2019, interviews were conducted with people who consume opioids in NSW and Victoria (some of whom had experience of using takehome naloxone), and relevant health professionals. These interviews gathered insights into, perspectives on, and experiences of both naloxone itself, and broader issues shaping the uptake and diffusion of THN in Australia. The research emphasises that, while participants across all groups viewed THN as necessary and effective, it needs to be supported by broader social, institutional and legal shifts. These interviews were used to inform a world-first website on personal experiences of overdose and THN (Overdoselifesavers.org).

Understanding Performance and Image-Enhancing Drug Injecting in **Australia**

Australia is experiencing a rise in the use of performance and imageenhancing drugs (PIEDs). PIED use carries a range of health risks and, because it often involves injecting, the possibility of blood-borne virus transmission, especially hepatitis C. This ARC-funded project investigates the social practices associated with men's use of PIEDs in Australia. It aims to generate new insights into the experiences of men who consume PIEDs to inform more appropriate and sensitive harm reduction initiatives, engagement strategies and hepatitis C prevention resources.

Assertive Youth Outreach in Australia: A Review of the Peer-Reviewed Literature

This project conducted a rigorous review of relevant international literature on youth alcohol and other drug outreach, to identify and document existing research on youth alcohol and other drug outreach: features of high-quality and desirable youth alcohol and other drug outreach models for young people; and major themes or issues in relation to youth alcohol and other drug outreach that need further research and consideration.

Lived Experiences of Alcohol Consumption and Dependence among Clients in South Western Sydney **Local Health District**

This South Western Sydney Local Health District-funded project will investigate the experiences and motivations of people who continue to drink heavily despite significant health problems or risks. The project will explore how people who experience difficulties associated with alcohol consumption give meaning to their consumption, manage and respond to alcohol dependence and other concurrent health conditions, and how they view and make decisions about accessing treatment for alcohol dependence in South Western Sydney Local Health District.

Rainbow Health Victoria



In amongst all the surprises and challenges of 2021, we have been continually surprised by the growing commitment out there to meeting the health and wellbeing needs of LGBTIQ communities.

COVID-19 has had a profound impact on all of our lives, and there is growing evidence that LGBTIQ communities are impacted disproportionately in a range of areas, including mental health, family violence, job security and housing.

This has spurred on the team here to push hard to deliver projects and activities that support knowledge and action to improve inclusion and outcomes for LGBTIQ communities.

Research impact

We've been lucky enough this year to have the Private Lives 3 and Writing Themselves In 4 reports in public circulation, and are continuing to partner with ARCSHS on a range of publications and supplementary research projects to focus in further on key issues for LGBTIQ health and wellbeing.

We have made the most of these robust and comprehensive research findings, pushing them out through presentations, training content, policy submissions and advocacy. In doing so, we've also continued to build strong relationships and partnerships with

government, peak bodies and service providers across a range of sectors.

This work has yielded significant progress in the last year, with growing formal recognition at both state and Commonwealth levels that LGBTIQ people require prioritisation in policy and funding frameworks across areas including mental health, family violence, ageing and aged care, and disability.

We look forward to building on this in coming years to make real improvements in inclusive service delivery and service systems, in funded research and data systems that include LGBTIQ people, and in a focus on prevention and health promotion to ensure long-term improvements in outcomes for LGBTIQ communities.

Service capability and access

Our collaborations with LGBTIQ community-controlled organisations have also strengthened in the last year. The way in which these organisations have stepped up to meet community need has been awe-inspiring, but we're also aware of the long-term and sustainable support they will need into the future, given the long-term impacts of the pandemic.

We have continued to facilitate a range of networks and forums that bring together LGBTIQ community-controlled organisations with mainstream services and providers seeking to improve their inclusive practice. These connections are continually demonstrated to be vital in building robust and safe service systems into the future.

We've also continued to update and improve all our training programs, making these available across the country through new online modules. And we're pleased to have signed on a new accreditation body, the Australian Council on Healthcare Standards, to assess organisations wishing to gain the Rainbow Tick.

We also launched an updated Rainbow Tick Framework and Guide to Accreditation in 2021. This guide will

help any organisations considering undertaking Rainbow Tick accreditation, and has been redesigned as a framework and practical guide to action for any organisation and any stage of their journey towards greater LGBTIQ inclusion.

Changing our name

As the year drew to a close, we decided to make a subtle change to our name and branding. From 2022, we will begin using the name Rainbow Health Australia.

This change is being made in response to the expansion in interest and uptake of our training and accreditation programs, and the growth in our national funding partners and stakeholder relationships. It also consolidates our role within ARCSHS as a nationally and internationally recognised research centre with a focus on LGBTIQ health and wellbeing.

We will continue to acknowledge the vital role of the Victorian Government in funding and supporting our work, and to have a strong focus on delivering on the ground in Victoria. Our name change formalises our aim to share and build upon this leadership to the benefit of LGBTIQ communities nationally.

Thanks to our partners and stakeholders for their commitment and engagement - it is wonderful to have achieved so much, and we look forward to building on this next year.

Research and policy

Rainbow Health Victoria has continued to play a leading role in LGBTIQ health and social policy reform, drawing on the findings of key studies such as Private Lives 3 and Writing Themselves In 4, as well as the revised Rainbow Tick framework, to provide advice to government and the health and human services sector.

Notable achievements include submissions to the next National Plan to Reduce Violence Against Women and their Children, attendance at the Women's Safety Summit, contributing to the next edition of Change the story, and co-hosting a seminar on the future of state mental health system reform in partnership with Mental Health Victoria and Thorne Harbour Health. Rainbow Health Victoria has also contributed to a range of advisory groups and expert panels relating to mental health, family violence prevention, ageing and aged care, gender equity, women's health, the impact of COVID-19, and LGBTIQ inclusion.

LGBTIQ-Inclusive Practice Training and Capacity-Building

With face-to-face training continuing to be unviable for the majority of the year, there was a high level of uptake of the flexible learning package we introduced in 2020 - a blended learning model consisting of an online asynchronous course, 'Introduction to LGBTIQinclusive practice,' and a 3-hour interactive webinar, 'Putting LGBTIQ inclusion into practice.

The online course was acquired by an additional 26 organisations, providing LGBTIQ-inclusive practice foundational education to a total of 2,372 staff members. The follow-up webinar was then provided 41 times, supporting approximately 1,435 staff members to contextualise and apply their learnings

in their own role and organisational contexts. In the short window between lockdowns, we were also able to provide two face-to-face sessions to approximately 50 learners.

Interest and uptake of our HOW2 training program continued to grow steadily, and we delivered two streams of the series of seven individual 3-hour online webinars, with approximately 70 organisational leaders being empowered to lead the way within their organisations in developing services and a culture that is inclusive for LGBTIQ staff and clients.

We also worked diligently behind the scenes this year in developing an update to our 'Introduction to LGBTIQinclusive practice' online course. incorporating the new data from Private Lives 3 and Writing Themselves In 4 as well as best-practice online education principles and techniques. We look forward to launching this new course in early 2022.

Rainbow Network

In 2021, Rainbow Network continued to build the capacity of mainstream services and organisations to provide safe, welcoming and inclusive services for young LGBTIQA+ Victorians.

Professional development sessions this year focussed on:

- Supporting healthy sex and sexuality
- Housing and experiences of homelessness
- Responding to suicide
- statistics and research from a practical perspective
- LGBTIQA+ young people and alcohol and other drug (AOD)

In addition to these sessions, open to anyone who works with LGBTIQA+

young people, we offered a series of Queer Worker Reflective Practice sessions.

We shared resources, research, opportunities and current good practice though our newsletters, website and social media, and developed resources focussed on preventing burnout, trans and gender diverse inclusion, and family of origin violence.

Rainbow Network continues to be an active member of the HEY partnership, and to represent the needs of LGBTIQA+ young people and the workers and services who support them, through advocacy, policy development and consultation.

LGBTIQ Family Violence Sector Capacity-Building Project

The project team spent the first part of the year engaging in a range of consultations to develop a set of key focus areas for change to improve LGBTIQ inclusion in the family violence sector. These include building a shared vision of LGBTIQ inclusion across family violence sector leadership, improving safety for LGBTIQ people at key entry points into the service sector, improving priority population pathways (GBTQ men and non-binary people), and strengthening mainstream family violence organisations' response to LGBTIQ family violence and improving connections with LGBTIQ specialist services. The project also continues to support the Queer Family Violence Sector Network.

LGBTIQ Family Violence Prevention Project

This project has continued to build on the success of 2020, developing mainstream and LGBTIQ community capacity in the emerging field of LGBTIQ family violence primary prevention.



This included successful piloting of several projects in partnership with key LGBTIQ community and mainstream primary prevention organisations. These projects were co-designed using the model proposed in Pride in Prevention, released in 2020.

In July we launched <u>Pride in Prevention</u> Messaging Guide: A guide to support communications and engagement in primary prevention of family violence experienced by LGBTIQ communities. This guide provides additional support to organisations and practitioners in developing effective and appropriate family violence prevention messaging, and delivering this through public campaigns, social media communications and policy work. It also aims to support community engagement in developing and delivering prevention messaging, and specifically engaging with LGBTIQ communities.

An independent evaluation of the project found that these resources and pilot projects successfully built the expertise for LGBTIQ organisations and family violence primary prevention organisations to design and deliver primary prevention activities, and had established a number of successful partnerships and networks to support capacity building and collaboration.

Queer Family Violence Sector Network

The Queer Family Violence Sector Network grew to over 1,000 members this year and continued to garner interest from Victorian and interstate sector participants, with quarterly online meetings regularly gathering over 100 attendees. This year, the Network held multiple communities of practice for the sector and collaborated with other organisations on monthly events in an effort to further strengthen connections between mainstream and LGBTIQ specialist services. The Network facilitated 11 community of practice sessions, 10 Service in the Spotlight webinars and over 40 hours of one-on-one consults with key sector organisations. The Network also collaboratively helped facilitate the LGBTIQ Family Violence Forum for the third year, with over 800 total session registrations and 400 unique attendees over 3 days.

Val's LGBTI Ageing and Aged Care

Throughout 2021, Val's provided information, training, events and support to the aged care sector and in

particular to the Victorian Community Home Support Program, as part of our sector support and development role building capacity and knowledge to support the sector to deliver LGBTIinformed, safe and inclusive care to older people.

The delivery of training remained central and was achieved completely via online platforms, with demand remaining strong. The delivery of training, workshops and events online enabled further geographic reach and a wider range of participants, with positive feedback - particularly from rural and regional providers – about increased accessibility. Seven forums and events with over 330 participants were conducted in partnership with aged care and sector stakeholders, including a number of events profiling older LGBTI people's experiences, to complement evidence-based research and further inspire and inform inclusive practice outcomes and action.

Val's created a range of educational resources and targeted sector-specific information, and throughout 2021 has worked on a new suite of resources, which will be released in 2022.

Rainbow Tick

Rainbow Tick continued to grow in 2021. There was an increase in the number of registrations and enquiries about Rainbow Tick accreditation compared to the previous year, with 19 organisations registered and 24 organisations accredited. This means that a total of 56 organisations

currently hold Rainbow Tick accreditation.

We launched the new Rainbow Tick standards: A framework for LGBTIQ cultural safety and Rainbow Tick accreditation and evidence guide early in 2021. Designed as a framework and practical guide to action, these updated resources will support any organisation at any stage of their journey towards greater LGBTIQ inclusion. We also introduced and launched a suite of Rainbow Tick tools and templates in the HOW2 learner materials, which received tremendously positive feedback from participants who used them in their workplace.

We are pleased to have signed on a new accreditation body, the Australian Council on Healthcare Standards (ACHS). ACHS joins Quality Innovation Performance as independent assessors for organisations wishing to gain Rainbow Tick.

Throughout 2021 we continued to offer Rainbow Tick Community of Practice sessions to support and connect those working to develop LGBTIQ safe and welcoming services. Using the Rainbow Tick standards as a framework to guide best practice, the group is open to people from any organisation, at any point in a journey towards LGBTIQ inclusion. These sessions grew in popularity this year, with 50-70 individuals logging in to each of the six capacity building and peer-to-peer learning sessions.

Rainbow Tick can also be used by any organisation at any stage to develop plans to improve LGBTIQ inclusion for consumers, staff and volunteers.

Teaching and higher degree research programs

The ARCSHS Higher Degree Research (HDR) program celebrated several successes in 2021. Students gave more than 35 presentations at conferences and other academic forums, and published nine papers and book chapters. Many students also presented their work at the monthly ARCSHS Learning Forums.

At the start of the year, we had 12 students. During the year, Lucille Kerr and Jake Franklin were awarded their degrees. In 2021, we also welcomed five new students: Michael Cecilio, Amber Loomis, Luke Burnett, Percy Gurtler and Alejandra Zuluaga Dugue. By the end of the year, we had 15 active students at various stages of preparing research proposals, collecting data and writing their theses. So far, we have also made offers to four potential new students for 2022

We are particularly proud of the tenacity and perseverance that our HDR students demonstrated in view of the dramatic shifts in study and research conditions throughout 2021.

Postgraduate supervisors contribute their time and expertise to work with students on their studies. Supervisors work in teams, with at least one principal supervisor and one co-supervisor for each student, as well as a panel of two or three other academic staff members who meet once a year to monitor each student's progress.

Undergraduate teaching program: Contemporary Issues in Sex and Sexuality

ARCSHS has been teaching this undergraduate subject since 2011.

Drawing on critical sexuality studies, the subject introduces students to a range of issues related to sex and sexuality in contemporary Australia, including debates regarding sexuality education, sexual health and sexual rights. The unit draws on a wide range of sources, including media, web-based material and theory from the social sciences and health, to help students examine and reassess the range of meanings, values, assumptions and expectations embedded in social understandings of sex and sexuality.

In 2021, we had 43 students enrolled in the unit.

Graduate Certificate in Sex, Health and Society

We commenced teaching the Graduate Certificate in Sex, Health and Society in 2020. This 1-year part-time course comprises four subjects:

- Sex, Sexuality and Sexual Health: Communication, Policy and Practice
- Sexual Bodies, Identities and Marginalisation
- Principles of Human Sexuality
- Research in Sex, Sexuality and Sexual Health

Drawing on the latest research on sex, sexuality and health, the course aims to help students develop multidisciplinary knowledge of human sexuality and its role in health and society. Students also discover how to create innovative programs and influence policies to improve the wellbeing of all communities.

In 2021, there were 16 students enrolled across the two subjects offered in the course. Students came from a range of backgrounds, including nursing and midwifery, community development, counselling, communications and the arts. Many students told us that they enrolled in the course to expand their knowledge with a view to moving into professional areas, such as sex education or women's health. Other students enrolled in the course to step back into further study while exploring an area of interest. Several students have gone on to further study, enrolling in Masters courses.

Due to COVID-19 restrictions, the course was taught entirely online, involving a mix of Zoom workshops and webinars. Students provided positive feedback on this teaching style and enjoyed the weekly discussions.

In memoriam: Dr Paulina Ezer

The ARCSHS community was saddened to learn in July of the sudden loss of Dr Paulina Ezer, a bright and intelligent early career researcher and colleague who completed her PhD at the Centre in 2020.

Paulina was a shining star among ARCSHS' many star students, bringing a sense of hope, passion and genuine curiosity to her research. She had an incredible work ethic and a huge amount of humility and respect for the work, and the people behind the work.

From 2016 to 2020, Paulina also taught Social Work Research B in the Discipline of Social Work, coordinated by Sarah MacLean, in the School of Allied Health, Human Services and Sport (SAHHSS). Students in the social work program told us every year that they valued her ability to communicate complex ideas and share her enthusiasm for research.

For the 8 months after graduation, Paulina was employed as a postdoctoral fellow in SAHHSS, working with Professor Karen Willis on her project, the Australian Frontline Healthcare Workers Study, and as a research assistant. In addition, Paulina continued working with her former primary supervisor, Christopher Fisher,





on several projects related to adolescent sexual health.

Paulina was a bright and intelligent early career researcher, with a research associate position at the University of Melbourne which she secured prior to graduation. She graduated with a number of influential publications in sexuality education research which many colleagues at La Trobe had the privilege of being co-authors on - an impressive body of work, collected here.

Paulina is remembered for her clarity. intelligence and thoughtfulness, which made her a wonderful colleague. She was a joy to be around, always willing to lend a helping hand, a shoulder to lean on and an ear to listen. She had a brightness about her that helped inspire many, and she built a number of strong

friendships within ARCSHS, at La Trobe and across Melbourne - people who became her second family, far away from her home in Toronto

Research impact profile: LGBTIQ+ Lives in Crisis

The Understanding LGBTIQ+
Lives in Crisis research project,
winner of the La Trobe
University 2021 Excellence in
Research Impact Award,
sought to examine experiences
and barriers to accessing
acute mental health support
services for LGBTIQA+
communities, a population
known to face
disproportionately high levels
of mental ill-health and
suicidality.

In 2018/2019, ARCSHS collaborated with the Lifeline Research Foundation, ACON Foundation and QLife on a research study exploring LGBTIQA+ experiences of using crisis support and counselling support services.

The findings of the study, published in the <u>Understanding LGBTI+ Lives in Crisis</u> report, noted that an overwhelming proportion (71%) of LGBTIQA+ people chose not to use a crisis support service during times of crisis or distress. Over half of these participants relied on peers or selfcoping methods instead, including selfharm or alcohol and other drug consumption.

Not using a service was commonly linked to concerns about experiencing discrimination while already feeling at risk or vulnerable. The findings of this work have significant implications for the development and management of crisis support and mental health and counselling support services for this population group, particularly as LGBTIQA+ people endure higher rates of mental health distress and suicidal ideation in comparison to the general population. Such rates are due to systemic and everyday experiences of discrimination, harassment, and violence.

The study has highlighted a significant problem that has since gained the attention of organisations and governments across the country. Outputs from this project continue to contribute significant impact at both government and community levels regarding mental health and LGBTIQA+people in Australia.

Policy, strategic and legislative impact

The findings of Understanding LGBTI+Lives in Crisis were used by numerous LGBTIQA+ and mainstream organisations in submissions to the Royal Commission into Victoria's Mental Health System (2021) and were featured across the Royal Commission's Interim Report and the Final Report (Volumes 1-3) to support changes to the mental health system in Victoria that address the needs of LGBTIQA+ people.

These changes include ensuring that services are safe, inclusive and funded to support the LGBTIQA+ population. The then Victorian Commissioner for LGBTIQ+ Communities, Ro Allen, made special reference to this body of work in their witness statement to the Royal Commission into Victoria's Mental Health System. This was echoed in the recent Strategic Framework for Suicide Prevention in NSW 2018-2023 (Mental Health Commission of New South Wales), the Australian Federation of AIDS Organisations' submission to The National Preventative Health Strategy (2020), and Suicide Prevention Australia's National Policy Platform (2020), which contributes to the development of important recommendations to better support suicide prevention for this community.

This work has also been used to support submissions into numerous government inquiries, including the Productivity Commission Inquiry into Mental Health (2020), which highlighted concerns about LGBTIQA+ people not using crisis support services during times of crisis.

Local governments have also adopted the findings. For example, Hobsons Bay Council's strategic framework, *A Fairer Hobsons Bay for All (2019-2023)*, draws on the project's findings to contribute to initiatives supporting LGBTIQA+ residents.



Understanding LGBTIQ+ Lives in Crisis has also been used in submissions to changes to the Equal Opportunity Religious Bodies Amendment Bill 2020 (SA) and the Religious Freedom Bills package (national), which note the need to protect LGBTIQA+ people from discrimination by religious institutions.

The work was also used to help secure Victorian state funding for the newly established Victorian Pride Centre (\$25 million) and for Switchboard Victoria's Rainbow Door program (\$400,000 recurring annually).

The project's findings have also influenced policies adopted by international medical organisations, including the Royal Australian and New Zealand College of Psychiatrists' Position Statement on Recognising and Addressing the Mental Health Needs of LGBTIQA+ People.

Communities and services impact

National organisations such as LGBTIQA+ Health Australia, Lifeline Australia and Suicide Prevention Australia have drawn on the study's findings to support their ongoing suicide prevention work and LGBTIQA+ inclusive practice programs and

Other LGBTIQA+ organisations, including QLife (national), ACON Foundation (New South Wales) and Switchboard (Victoria), have also benefited from the research to support their work in mental health services and

suicide prevention support to LGBTIQA+ people.

Mainstream organisations such as the Mental Health Coordinating Council (New South Wales) and Perinatal Anxiety & Depression Australia have also featured the research to support their work in LGBTIQA+ inclusion.

Pathway to impact

The <u>Understanding LGBTI Lives in Crisis report</u> was promoted through multiple avenues, including a media release, a Fairfax syndicated article by study chief investigator Dr Andrea Waling, LGBTIQA+ community and youth-focussed radio appearances, and direct sharing with LGBTIQA+ organisations (including at Rainbow Network workshops for organisations and practitioners), with a successful call to action for further sharing.

Academic impact

The report is now listed as recommended reading for a University of Tasmania undergraduate course in the Faculty of Education, which will support future generations of teachers and educators who may work with LGBTIQA+ young people.

The findings of this work supported additional research and knowledge exchange with the North Western Melbourne Primary Health Network in 2020/2021 and community organisations that include Flat Out, Thorne Harbour Health, Undercurrent Victoria, Switchboard, Zoe Belle Gendel Collective and Bevond Blue.

This included the Lean on Me project, funded by the North Western Melbourne Primary Health Network, where researchers examined the ways LGBTQA+ people provide peer support for suicide prevention in the community.

The <u>Lean on Me: Exploring suicide</u> prevention and mental health-related peer support in Melbourne's LGBTQ communities report has appeared on national and international websites, including Genderqueer Australia (Australia) and the Centre for Suicide Prevention (Canada).
